In the midst of some heavy duty stuff this past week (emergency major surgery, lack of finances both personally and for Casa Hogar; conflicts, accusations, and misunderstandings, not to mention major challenges with teenagers), Fran prayed for me the verse from Jeremiah 29:11. "For I KNOW the plans that I have for YOU" declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for calamity, to give you a future and a hope." When everything surrounding us seems bleak, and believe me, it did, it is so awesome to know and to depend on HIM. He knows it all, the start from the finish and everything in between. Madai Lopez Garcia, age 22, is a junior in college where she is studying accounting. Casa Hogar has been Madai's home for eleven years. Her father is a pastor up in a mountain village about one hour northwest of Oaxaca. She is the second oldest of 11 children.

Madai is an exceptionally hard worker. Besides her studies she is also a dorm "mom" for seven of the youngest girls here at Casa Hogar. For the past 4½ years she has been a surrogate mom to five year old Flor, who has a harelip and clef palate. Madai lives a disciplined and well moderated life plus is always looking out for the best interest of the kids.

If all goes as planned Madai will graduate in 2½ years with a bachelors degree in accounting. Please keep her in your prayers as the public university system is riddled with many serious problems and conflicts.



David Blasyck led a group from Cloquet Lutheran Church, Cloquet MN. In ten days they completely reorganized the third floor. The third floor is storage area for the extras we use at Casa Hogar as needs arise ~ things like toothpaste and shoes, blankets, and socks. They also built a closet with shelves near the office to hold all the school supplies. It is very neat and is easy access for Maribel to hand out needed pens, paper and other school items.



Fourteen ladies from The River Church, Faribault MN blessed us with their time spent at Casa Hogar, A girl's dorm was painted and new curtains were made! They came prepared to paint...just look at those ladies in white. To prepare for this trip the ladies had a large garage sale and a silent auction. Plus the members of The River donated many items for the ladies to bring down to Casa Hogar.



In March Dr. Paul Johnson, his wife Lois and dental assistant Ann from Marshall MN arrived for a very packed week that started with teeth cleanings and exams. Casa Hogar rented a local dentist office which was used to do more advanced dental work. Flexibility and improvising were common as cavities were filled. All but six children and workers were seen and treated. They also came with suitcases loaded with needed items for the kids. Everyone got a new toothbrush, toothpaste and floss with instruction on how to properly use them.


